

In the fall of the year, do you ever feel that if you never water another plant or pull another weed, it would be way too soon? Your partner is standing at the door, daring you to bring to the house another container of anything from the garden. But, there are berries to pick and carrots and potatoes to dig! The bush cherries have yet to be touched! I understand why some of the gardeners of copious quantities of produce, go hunting for a month in the fall.

Tonight, I am trying to complete the yearly reports to the NRCS about what went on in the High Tunnels during last gardening season. Don't they know that pulling weeds is more enjoyable (and urgent) than record keeping?

I've already planted sweet potatoes from the 'tater I found trying to grow in the bottom of a storage bin. This will be the third year of attempting to grow this crop. I actually had some last season big enough to save! I've made room for them in the crop rotation, but, this may be the last year because they require so much space. I'm trying to use the garden space wisely.

Also, the fresh bottom 1 ½ inches from store-bought spring onions have been potted. I have new growth about 2 inches high, and am projecting fresh onion greens within two weeks.

Next week, we may start replacing tomatoes in the third floor buckets. I'm trying to think of anything to delay going out to the cold High Tunnel to resume building the eleven garden boxes that I told the NCRS would be ready to go in the spring. After all, I have all winter to work on them.....

See, if you are really into this, the garden never ends!

Changing subjects, I have a different job with the school district. It even comes with a desk and phone! No computer or Email yet (maybe tomorrow). I do not have a cubical; it is more like a triangle. I'm still associated with buses but won't spend much time behind the wheel. Today I was hiding, oops; I mean working in my triangle, when I heard two people talking in the Purchasing Dept. next to me. They were trying to figure out where to find Alaskan grown produce. My ears grew two feet and I ran, oops I mean casually walked out to talk with them. They had no idea where to make contact with the local growers. The lady said that they needed someone to supply lots of apples.

Needless to say, with some effort getting a phone number, School District purchasing now has the phone number for O'Brien Nursery. Also, Purchasing now realizes that there is a University Extension Office who would really like to help them make local producer contacts. Agriculture has come a long ways on the Kenai, but baby, there is still a greater distance to go.


(I'll bet Monti will work this into a reason why I need to finish those raised beds.)

December 8th Program Presented by Dohnn Wood—The Miracle of (1500 Pounds of Almost) Free Food.



Dohnn Wood wore a Santa hat for his Dec. 8th program presentation. Dohnn gets maximum yield from his growing areas

Dohnn Wood's Co-planting intensive planting scheme.

- Large circles are brassica's (broccoli, cabbage, etc.) or other large long term plants i.e. celery 12in circles
- Medium circles are lettuce, spinach, beets, onion, spinach, lettuce or other compatible companion veggies 5in circles
- Small circles are carrots, radish, green onion, boc choy, other root veg's 3 in circles

If you want to grow a plant that is bigger than the 12" circle you can plant quick maturing plants that would get covered by the big plant mid to late season in the outer circles, that you just harvest before they get shaded out. *John Jeavons* book how to grow more vegetables is where I first learned of this concept, but many different sources on co-planting and beneficial co-planting out there.
